Functional differential equations arise in many applied sciences fields. Very recently, there was an active research movement that mainly and significantly developed methods and techniques for studying the qualitative theory differential equations.

Neutral delay differential equations arise in various phenomena, including problems concerning electric networks containing lossless transmission lines (as in high-speed computers where such lines are used to interconnect switching circuits), in the study of vibrating masses attached to an elastic bar or in the solution of variational problems with time delays, or in the theory of automatic control and in neuromechanical systems in which inertia plays a major role...
