Due to the characteristics of memory and intrinsic nonlinearity, memristors have broad application prospects in fields such as flash memory, logic circuits, synapses, neural networks, and oscillator circuits. Among these, memristor-based applications have been intensively investigated, such as discrete and continuous memristive chaotic systems, memristive neural systems, and memristive nonlinear networks. Meanwhile, fractional calculus is a 300-year-old topic, and now, it has been introduced to different nonlinear systems. Moreover, applications of fractional-order calculus have aroused much interest. As a result, fractional-order discrete and continuous memristors, as well as fractional-order. memristor nonlinear systems, have been designed. As a result, symmetry coexisting attractors are found in those systems. For this Special Issue, we focus on discrete and continuous memristive nonlinear systems with or without fractional calculus and their applications, such as nonlinear systems, neural networks, brain-like computing, information encryption, and symmetry.
