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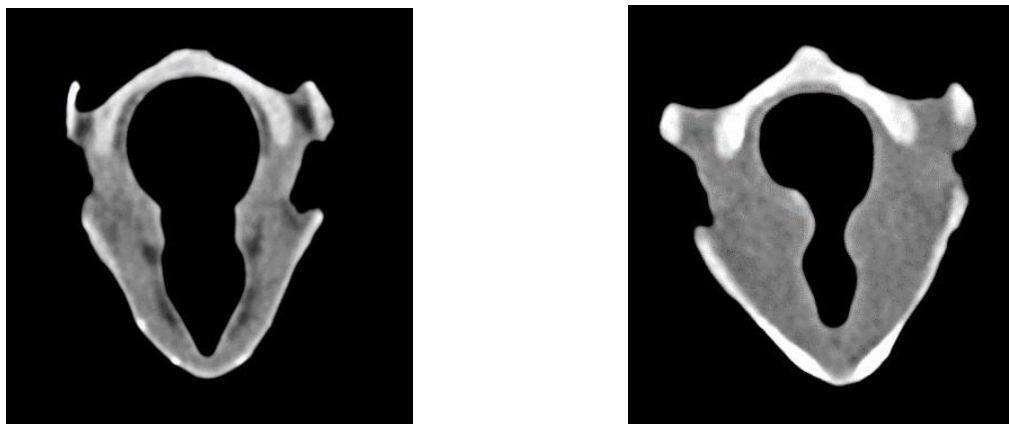
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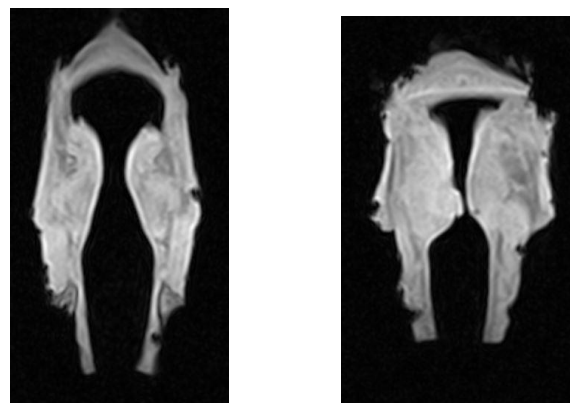
Figure S1. CT and MRI images of the fixed larynges.

CT images

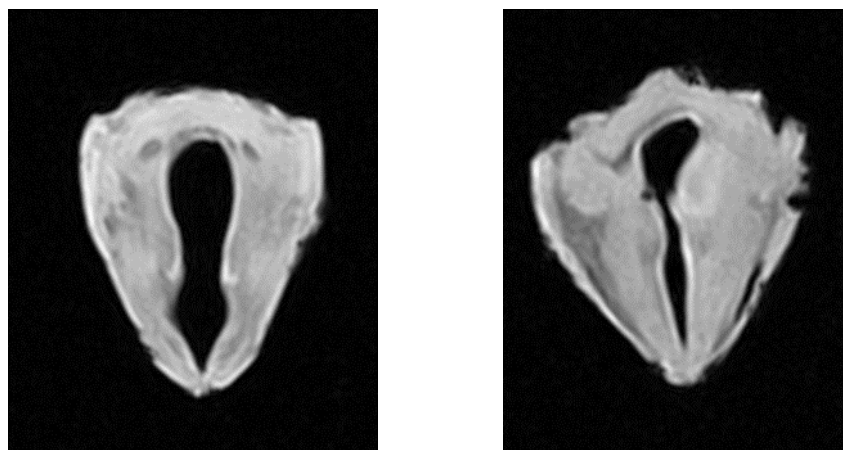

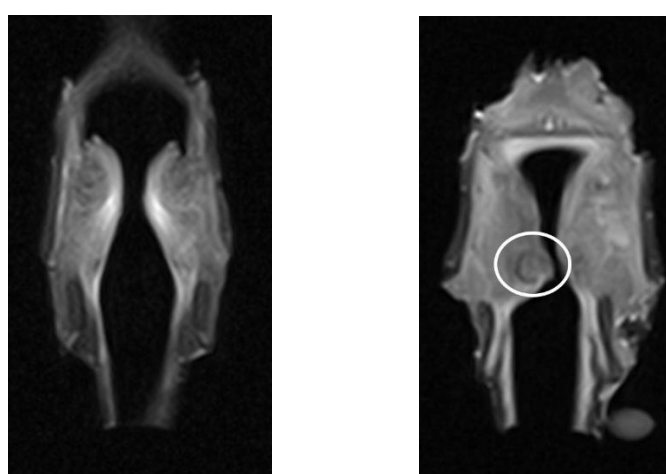

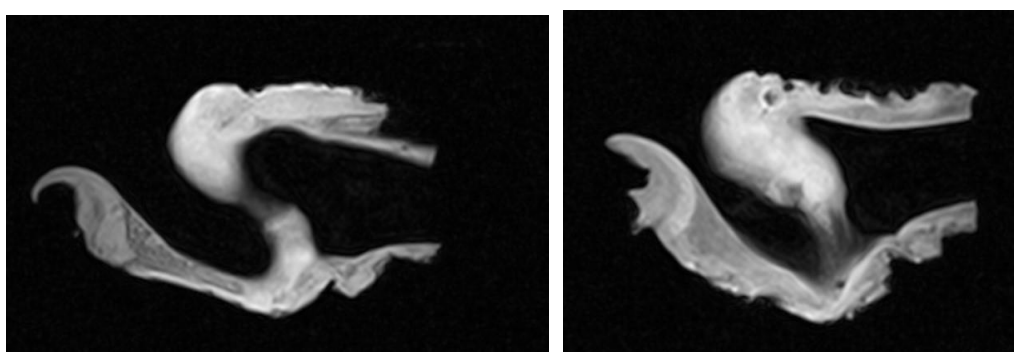
T1W 3D HR Frontal slices (BL8 left, TX1 right)
