Childhood-onset psoriasis has recently received increasing attention, particularly because of its significant medical, and psychological burdens and its associated comorbidities. Infantile hemangiomas are the most common pediatric vascular tumors, and despite their benign nature, they may have serious consequences, possibly affecting the aesthetic and functional outcomes as well as representing dramatic life-threatening conditions.
