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Message from the Guest Editors

Demographic ageing is a worldwide phenomenon that places significant challenges to all societies. Although ageing is a highly individual and variable process, with many older adults ageing well and healthy in several life domains, many others are frail and vulnerable to complex chronic conditions that challenge the current approaches to care. There is a need to re-think healthcare, rehabilitation, and health promotion, with a focus on the development of integrated and empowering interventions.
