According to a recent article in *The Guardian*, the 'questions of representation that have upended Hollywood, television and politics in recent years are now hitting the world of children's literature hard'. We agree and agree also with the article's subsequent celebration of the increased diversity of representation in texts for children, as well as their growing willingness to engage with an expanded range of political issues. We would also suggest, however, that this achievement ironically brings with it a narrowing of debate: mainstream contemporary discussion tend to focus on 'representation', while overlooking issues of literary perspective and textual difference that might question this operation.

We invite article submissions that move away from thinking about Children's Literature and the political in an instrumental fashion and turn instead to the question of how both the political in general and the political subject in particular are constructed within Children's Literature texts. Articles might address the framing of debates, their constitutive antagonisms, or their occluded histories.
