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Evidence-Based Effects of Irregular Working Hours on Physical and Mental Health

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Message from the Guest Editors

Dear Colleagues,

Today's 24/7 society means that many individuals now work night shifts or have irregular working hours. At the European level, around 20% of employees work in shifts. Night shifts or irregular working hour arrangements are required in many occupations-e.g., in commerce and hospitality, including the retail sector, where 50% of employees are women. The same is also true for the health and social care sector, which has irregular working hour systems. Since night work is a known risk factor for increased fatigue and chronic diseases, circadian dysrhythmia, and disturbed sleep due to the characteristics of shift work (e.g., the length and timing of shifts) and psychosocial or behavioural mechanisms, irregular working hours should be investigated in terms of their evidence-based effects on physical and mental health. This Special Issue calls for research on the working hour characteristics of the irregular working hours in the health and social care sector, as well as in other occupational areas such as the retail sector.
