Dear Colleagues,

Job satisfaction (JS) is a crucial part of a human's wellbeing in the world of work. In the evaluation of the work environment, JS is seen as an "output" factor and used as a synonym for wellbeing. While this is one of the main research directions, JS is also seen as an "input" for attitudes and behavior. As part of many studies and employee surveys, JS can be either measured as a global variable (single-item) or with various facets (multiple-items). The global variable is useful and helpful if JS is used as output or wellbeing indicator.

In this Special Issue, we aim to shift the focus to the advantage of measuring JS with different dimensions or facets, which allows separating the influencing factors on the working environment.

The aim of this Special Issue is to look for contributions that focus on the issue of job satisfaction in conjunction with interventions at work, health promotion projects, work design, or similar approaches. We also welcome contributions which discuss the use and concepts of the measurement of JS with single-item and multiple-items.
