The extracellular matrix (ECM) is a three-dimensional molecular network complex including growth factors and ECM molecules such as collagens, laminins, and proteoglycans. ECM not only serves as a scaffold to support various biological structures but also implicates multiple biological processes (cell migration, invasion, proliferation, differentiation, and survival). More importantly, there is accumulating evidence that ECM is a dynamic microenvironment. In particular, ECM is processed by matrix proteases during disease initiation and progression, such as viral infection and malignancy. Thus, ECM proteolysis plays a significant role in many human diseases.
