In recent years, great progress has also been made in understanding the pathogenesis of the most common inflammatory skin diseases such as psoriasis, atopic dermatitis, and hidradenitis suppurativa that has led to the development of selective and targeted innovative therapies. In particular, biological drugs (chimeric, humanized, and fully human monoclonal antibodies), biosimilars, and small molecules have completely revolutionized the treatment of chronic inflammatory skin diseases by opening new avenues for us clinicians. However, significant research efforts are still needed. New studies are needed to identify biomarkers for each disease, so that we clinicians may be able to diagnose and treat chronic inflammatory diseases early and predict responses to treatments so that we can choose the best treatment for each type of patient.
