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Message from the Guest Editors

It is common knowledge that medicines may induce or worsen several diseases. In some cases, drug-induced diseases are characterized by clinical and/or laboratory distinctive findings that are different from those of the correspondent "primary" diseases. In the elderly patients, polypharmacology has specific effects, often absent in other age groups, so that the role of over-the-counter products is by no means secondary. Moreover, age-related changes are possible both in pharmacodynamics and in pharmacokinetics.

The purpose of this Special Issue of *Medicines* is to explore all aspects of the wide world of drug-induced diseases in the elderly. We invite all colleagues to submit their research or review manuscripts on this important topic.
