The treatment of waste soils of different mineralogical composition is an increasingly common practice in many fields of geotechnical engineering, and responds to the demand for sustainability of the built environment, as an essential condition for constructions in the perspective of environmental protection. We are happy to invite researchers involved in this field to submit their contributions on the multiscale analysis of the effects induced by traditional and non-traditional binders on the treatment of soils of different origin and mineralogical nature, in order to improve their physical and hydromechanical properties. The aspects of interest will concern both the chemical-physical evolution induced by the treatment and the microstructural reorganisation of the treated soils, up to the analysis of the hydro-mechanical behaviour (water retention, hydraulic conductivity, stiffness, shear strength, etc.) in static and dynamic conditions. Contributions will be particularly welcome on the durability of the properties induced by the treatment under environmental loads (wetting/drying, freezing/thawing, leaching, etc.) with reference to the different scales of the problem.
