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Message from the Guest Editor

This Special Issue will bring together high-quality research on the psychological context of variation in socioeconomic and psychosocial deprivation on children and adults. More specifically this Special Issue will provide a rapid, open-access outlet for high-quality peer-reviewed research on the Psychology of Socioeconomic and Psychosocial Deprivation. Studies exploring neuropsychological/physiological, cognitive, emotional, and resilience factors are particularly welcome. Empirical reports could describe observational studies, such as the psychological correlates of socioeconomic and psychological deprivation gradients. In addition, specific groups are also of interest, such as people experiencing homelessness, foster care, child labor, servitude, etc. However, cross-cultural, longitudinal, and intervention studies are particularly encouraged. Studies may also report experimental findings, such as the effects of debt rumination on physiological or psychological processes. Review articles are also accepted. However, reviews should strive to provide balanced coverage of the extant literature. In this regard, systematic reviews and meta-analyses are particularly encouraged.
